African Swine Fever

African Swine Fever (ASF) is a highly contagious viral disease of domestic and wild pigs. While ASF has not been found in the United States, recent outbreaks in Asia and Eastern Europe have highlighted the importance of taking preventive measures to protect susceptible species in your collection from this viral disease, particularly if any staff or visitors may have recently traveled to countries where the disease has been found. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) ASF information page and National Pork Board (NPB) Foreign Animal Disease Resource page both contain a number of excellent resources to help you learn more and prepare.

Anyone who works with pigs should be familiar with the signs of ASF:

High fever

- Decreased appetite and weakness
- Red, blotchy skin or skin lesions
- · Diarrhea and vomiting
- Coughing and difficulty breathing

Suspected cases of ASF should be reported to your <u>State Animal Health Official (SAHO)</u> or <u>Area Veterinarian in Charge (AVIC)</u>.

Foreign Animal Diseases such as ASF have the potential to be used as biological terror agents. If you see any suspicious activity around your facility you can report it by calling 855-TELL-FBI (855-835-5324) or contacting the Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) Directorate Coordinator at your local field office.

Preparedness Focus: Communication

July's preparedness focus is <u>communication</u>. A disaster impacting your facility may disrupt normal communications within your facility as well as with the outside world. Consider the following:

- How will you communicate with staff and guests on grounds during a disaster?
 - Has this method of communication been tested for functionality in shelter in place areas? Do these areas have a way to charge radios or cellphones?
- Do you have a plan for how to communicate with individuals and agencies off-site?
 - Is this plan easily accessible to staff that may be on grounds during an emergency? Is information for all emergency contacts included and up to date?
- How will you communicate if cell service is not working?
 - Do you have a designated contact outside of the area that you may be able to reach if local circuits are exhausted? Has your facility looked into buying or renting a satellite phone that could be used if other methods of communciation are down?
